

An Act to Call a Convention of the People | may recommend the abolishment of of North Carolina.

WHEREAS, The present Constitution of North Carolina is, in many important particulars, unsuited to the wants and condition of our people; and whereas, in the judgment of this General Assembly, a convention of the people is the only sure, and is besides the most economical mode of altering or amending it, and believing the end in view utterly impracticable by legislative enactment on account of the great number of discordant and conflicting provisions of the Constitution

Section 1. The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact, (two-thirds of all the members of each House concurring.) That a Convention of the people of North Carolina, be and the same is hereby called to meet in the Hall of the House of Representatives in the city of Raleigh, on Monday, 6th day of September, A. D., 1875, for the purpose of considering and adopting such amendments to the Constitution as they deem necessary and expedient, subject only to the restrictions hereinafter provided.





It is probably true that farmers sometimes pay a higher rate of interest than is prudent; but they seek the money, the money does not seek them, and their failure to comply with own credit, but that of their neighbors. The statutes provide a quick way of reaching a crop if any attempt be niade to defeat the lien upon it; but infinite harm will be done if any speaker be allowed, without rebuke, to advise farmers that they are justified, under any circumstances, in endeavoring to avoid complying with the terms of their bargain. Such conduct would prevent many farmers Charlotte, N. ### Something Every Farmer ought to know.

The Colorada potato-bug is produced by the deposit of the eggs of bug resembling in shape the ladybug, but three times as large, with stripes instead of spots. A crop of potatoes can be easily saved by killing this bug, which is very clumsy. One will deposit thousands of eggs in a little while. The eggs should be looked for and crushed, which is very easily done, as they are deposited in clusters of hundreds. When first hatched the bug is very small, but hunting or fishing, either with or withwork. I write this, believing that a so doing. great many persons do not know how eashy they may save their potatoes from the ravages of these strange insects. The crop should be examined frequently, to prevent the return of the bug.

SALT FOR CABBAGE.—A New Jersey gardener considers salt necessary to the development of cabbage, especially in places far from the coast. He finds them more crisp, of better flavor. and to keep better when salt is used than without. He used it as follows: "A few days after setting out the plants, and when they are damp, either after a rain or when the dew is on, I take a small dish of fine salt, and, walking among 'the rows, sprinkle a little pinch of salt on the centre of Ten copies, addressed to each subeach plant when the leaves begin to grow. I repeat the salting, and when Weekly Dispatch, Single Copy, the centre of leaves begin to form the head I apply salt again, scattering it over the leaves. After this I look them over occasionally, and if I find A quart of salt is sufficient for five hundred plants in a season, although more can be used with safety."





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
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
