MORE ABOUT MR. HASTY'S ADDRESS.

Mr. Hasty, in his circular published in our columns last week, makes the humiliating confession that the present Constitution is not of North Carolina origin.

But these are not the only evils to be apprehended from Radical domination. They utterly repudiate all submission to the Legislative restrictions.

1st. They will gerrymander the Senatorial, Congressional and Judicial Districts. This will secure to them the Senate, several negro delegates in Congress, some negro judges and solicitors in the East.

2d. They will make us pay the eleven millions of Special Tax Bonds which the Conservatives have persistently refused to recognize.

3d. They will provide for mixed schools, as in South Carolina, and by compulsory measures force upon us social equality.

4th. They will issue more bonds, for the party is as corrupt as it was in 1868. And finally, they will secure and perpetuate their schemes by making them organic; will strike out Article XIII, which provides for amending the Constitution; and thus fasten their iniquitous measures upon us forever.

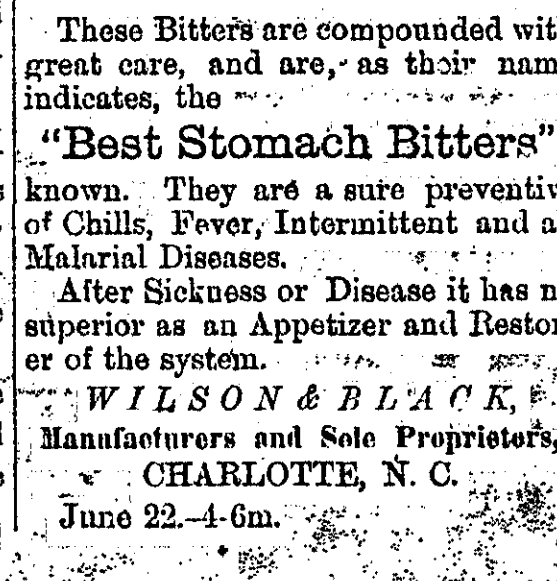
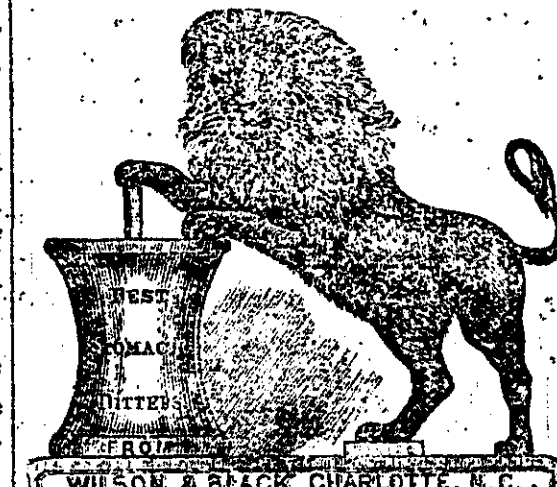
