

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

Avoid running into debt. and curtail expenses by wise sconomy and you are on the gura road to wealth and prosperity-may laugh at hard times and the money pressure. Pay as you go is the true philosopher's stone. Work and economize."

And to this we may fitly add, plant less cotton and more corn and other produce. Make your own composts and fertilizers, and quit going in debt for costly guanos, &c., that often fail altogether, and never last more than one season. Our farming friends have probably been advised in the same words as above until they are tired of hearing them, but facts are facts, and we never expect to see our country improve or become more prosperous as long as the largest portion of the people keep their corn cribs, wheat garners and smoke houses in Northern or Western countries, and to buy their provisions on credit at long prices to be paid for in cotton, which is often sold for less than it costs to make it. Where the same of the


