of United States legal tender notes:

"Be it enacted, etc. That from and after the passage of this act it shall not be lawful for the Secretary of the Treasury, or other officers under him. to cancel or retire any more the United States legal tender notes, and when any of said notes may be redeemed or be received into the Treasury under any law from any source whatever, and shall belong to the United States, they shall not be retired, cancelled or destroyed, but shall be re-issued and paid out again and kept in circulation, provided that nothing herein shall prohibit the cancellation and destruction of mutilated notes and the issue of other notes of like denomination in their stead, as now provided by law. All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are

hereby repealed." It now goes to the President for his signature.



We would suggest, therefore, tha our new set of Commissioners begin their year's work by passing an ordinance requiring every householder to keep his streets and premises in a cleanly condition, and that the Marshal see that the ordinance is strictly

It would also be well, while they are working for public good, that they prohibit the keeping of guanes, and other commercial fertilizers within a quarter of a mile of the public square. This practice has been an intolerable nuisance for the past three or four years, and we are surprised to see that no action has been taken in regard to




