A Bill Criminal Jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact : : Section 1. Justices of the Peace shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to hear, try and determine the offences enumerated in sections 43, 85, 112, 116, 117, 119, 120, and 139. of Chap. 32, Battle's Revisal as amended by chap. 176, of the laws of 1873, 1874. And the punishment for every such offence shall not exceed a fine of

They are too poor to milk, and can't begotten fat enough from the pasturing in the Summer to make beef of. And another error is in never knowing what to do if one and it dies without a thought. These experience, that it will yield as much wthings should be changed, and must be before we can thrive.

To show the advantage of well kept cows, I will cite a single instance. took up a cow last Winter that was so poor I offered to take ten dollars for her-failing to get that, I determined to make her saleable. I stabled her and got her in condition, then turned her to an Ayrshire bull in the Spring. In the Fall I was offered thirty-five dollars for her and refused it; she now has a fine halfblood calf and will give three gallous of milk per day. She has her stable every night with plenty to eat, and pays well in appearance, if in no other way, for my trouble. Let each farmer take up one cow and try my plan, he will be delighted.—S. R, of Pitt County, in Raleigh Farmer & Mechanic.


