Registered Letters.

Nothwithstanding the frequent explanation of the mehod of registering letters for transmission in the mails, many persons who present letters for registration seem utterly ignorant of the fact that the only difference in the start between a registered letter and one not registered is that the sender gets a receipt for the former, and has to pay, in addition to postage a registry fee of ten cents in postage stamps (or one ten cent stamp.) letter to be registered should be sealed or closed, and the postage and fee prepaid with the stamps just as if it were to be dropped into the receptacle at the post-office or in a street letter box. The name and address of the sender (which should be on every letter sent through the mails, whether registered or not,) must, moreover, be written or printed on the envelope-When these simple conditions are complied with, the letter is ready for registration. The stamps required to prepay the postage on letters, registered or unregistered, are procured in this place at the post office. When money is enclosed in a regis tered letter the amount need not be made known to the registering clerk.

Counterfeit Silver Dollars. New and excellent counterfeit silve dollars are just out, and will deceive every one unless careful attention is paid. The general appearance of the piece is very good indeed. Even acids will not act on it. The weight, however, is against it, the scales showing that it has just seven-tenths of the weight which the standard dollar should have. 




