A Wouderful Runner.

THE GREAT PEDESTRIAN ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE PRESENT DAY. A. ...

The feats of our pedestrians, though surprising enough, are cast into the shade by the recorded exploits of Ernst Mensen, a Norwegian sailor in the English navy, early in the present century. Although for a long time known to his shipmates as an extraordinary runner, he first attracted public attention by running from London to Portsmouth, a distance of 73 miles, in nine hours, on a wager that he could not accomplish the feat in ten hours. and soon after he ran from London to Liverpool, 150 miles, in 32 hours.— Mensen did not quit the sea until he had distinguished himself in the battle of Navarino in 1827, but shortly after that date, he became a professional runner. After winning a number of lesser matches he was induced to undertake the great feat of runuing from Paris to Moscow. He started from the Place of Vendome at 4 o'clock in the afternoon of June 11, 831, and entered the Kremlin at 10 o'clock, A. M. of June 25, having accomplished the distance of 1,760 miles

In 1833, he started from Munich at P. M., June 6, with dispatches from the King of Bavaria to his son Otto, King of Greece. These dispatches were delivered at Nauplia at 9 A. M., July 1, or seven days sooner than if they had been sent by the regular post. In 1836, while in the employ of the British East India Company, Menor in one-third of the time made by the swiftest caravan.



Greenville, Tenn. Pea and Corn Culture.

I see in the April number of your most excellent mazazine, an article from Mr. Frank G Ruffin, in relation to planting corn and peas, which he supposes to be a new idea. I am a sort of Carolina farmer, and have been planting on the plan he speaks of for more than twenty-five years.

I prepare and plant as follows: run centre furrows six feet apart; I throw six furrows on that furrow, leaving a small balk which I burst out with a 6-inch shovel. I sow about fifty or sixty poun is guano in said furrow.— I then throw two more furrows on it. making a ridge. I then take a small plant my corn in it about thirty to

bull-tongue and split that ridge and plant my corn in it about thirty to thirty-six inches. I then plow out my corn twice. Then, the third plowing I throw four furrows to the corn, leaving a narrow balk in the middle, which I burst open with a small shovel plow—then I drop my peas about the same distance as my corn. I have my best plow hands to make the next furrow just as before, covering the peas with the bar of the plow. I come around the fourth time, throwing four furrows to the corn; then run around the peas with a sweep plow, which coupletes the work of corn and peas. I should have stated that I manure the corn again the second plowing. 
