Forty in a Duel.

The process of making the hollow rubber balls used by children for playthings is quite curious, and may be interesting to those not familiar with it. A Holyoke writer thus describes it. The upper room of the mill is prepared to push this branch of the business for a few months, and it wil probably turn out some 50,000 dozen of those balls between January and June. These balls have a solid surface, are made by a different process from that of making the soft rubber balls which are perforated by an opening, and of course, are much, more firm, durable and elastic. The sheets of rubber prepared for the balls are cut into strips of double convex shape. The edges of the strips are moistened with a preparation of rubber and naphtha, by which they are joined firmly together, three of the stripes being used for one ball. When the strips are joined together, the ball is very near the shape of a Brazil nut. Before the last opening is closed, a small quantity of carbonate of amonia is put inside, which when subjected to a strong heat, will make the rubber expand and fill out the bald mold. The opening is then closed with the adhesive mixture, and it is placed in an iron mold of the size and shape of the ball desired The molds are packed into frames in which they are subjected to the heat of the vulcanizer. Orchard Grass.

Among the cultivated grasses, there is none so well adapted to our latitude as the Cocasfoot or Orchard Grass. We have seen it flourishing in North Alabama, and doing equally as well on the lighter soils of South Alabama. It comes nearer than any other grass to supplying the desideratum for a Winter pasturage, and in conjunction with the Bermuda, jurnishes the Southern farmer good feed for stock nearly the whole year round. It is both a hay and grazing grass, but better for grazing than hay making, because when permitted to grow ach, at others, entirely gone; fleeting tall it becomes:coarse, but when fed close is tender and valuable. It is inclined to grow in bunches, but if heavily seeded and repeatedly mowed not unfrequently tinged with blood it takes complete possession of the ground, and covers it with a rich sward. Orchard or Cocksfoot is one of the few grasses which make more and better hay when cut in the seed, than in the flower, because the seed mature before the stalks and blades are ripe.

It may be sown either in the Fall or Spring-any time from Septemb to June. The ground should be tho :oughly and deeply ploughed, having first been properly enriched, and injury to the most tender infant. about two bushels of seed sowed to the acre, which should be covered by a careful harrowing. When once properly set it will afford an excellent pasture for a number of years, and it will therefore pay to take pains in seeding it. A clean smface, close and deep preparation and good manuring are necessary to euture a good set of grass of any gort. With these conditions, there is no trouble in getting a good stand of Orchard Grass. A correspondent of the Farmer and Mechanic, in speaking of grass says:
