Goldsboro, Sept. 12-4 P. M. A most destructive cyclone passed near this town this morning shortly before 7 o'clock and destroyed everything before it. Save Your Wheat from Rust.

I have been investigating the subyears, and since its first appearance last Spring I have had this fungus under close and constant inspection.

It is generally conceded, other things being equal, that rust is worse in a wet than in a dry season.

I have noticed that if, from the exposure of the roots or from other causes, the plant is checked in in its growth the epidermis becomes rough like the bars of a stunted shrub; also that the rust attacks such stalks ear-. Her and more severely than the others. The spore which propagates this fungus is extremely small, and floats in the air like dust.

. . As these spores move through the air, if they come in contact with wet or rough stems, they may, and often . do, stick until they can fasten themselves to the upright stem, or culm, which they attack and produce "killing rust." If the stem soon dries, they are apt to be blown off, unless the former is rough, and no iserious harm is done. The spores usually fall on the upper side of the blade and produce "blade rust." This injures the plant, but not so seriously as when if the culm is attacked. If they fall between the stem and sheath they soon die for want of air and light, and the plant is not injured by them.

2. The plant should be made as vigorous as possible, so as to render the spidermis smooth, and thereby prevent the attachment of the spores.

1. To prevent root exposure (and consequent rough epidermis) by the freezes and thaws of Winter, let our farmers plant a smaller area and break the land thoroughly before seeding. Then let the sped be put in with harrows; or if plows be used, they should small, and the land should be rolled or brushed after seeding.

2. To secure a vigorous growth, the land should be rich and the basis of the fertilizer used should be either stable manure or wood ashes.
