

He had found out that oats afforded better food for horses and mules than corn, and that he could make three bushels of oats as easily as one bushel of corn. He, therefore, now planted oats for his work animals, and corn for bread and to fatten his hogs. Following his oat crop with a pea crop, he found that it improved his land, and supplied him with food for cattle and hogs. We forgot to ask cur friend about commercial fertilizers, but feel sure that if we had, he would have said: "I buy much less of commercial fertilizers, and make far more of home-made manures."

"Sorrow is knowledge," and the last eight or ten years of trouble have taught our people many wholesome lessons. We are doing better because we have learned in the school of adversity, how to do better. At the foundation of the present hopeful condition of affairs, are mainly two things; first economy, and secondly better and wiser farming. - Darlington News.

The present watchword is, make manure at home, and let commercial fertilizers alone. But the truth is, that just in proportion as a farmer accumulates home-made manure, just to buy commercial fertilizers. Neither is complete without the other. One supplements the other, not merely in the sense of making it "go farther," which it does, but in improving their natures, making them better suited as food for plants. A vegetable requires a mixed diet as, well as an animal. A plant cannot live on ammonia alone, any more than an animal could on an exclusive diet of starch. 




