



I have cultivated els per acre. it several years by various modes, and from my experience with it this season, I conclude that the hill system is the best; and that July is the best time to plant; and that old plants, if strong, are the best for setting, as they live better and bear a fuller crop for me than the young tender ones. I have tried both classes of plants. The old ones are hard and tough, and will stand hot weather much better until they become established. The plant is of quick growth and makes runners quite rapidly. These must be cut off however, as fast as they come, and the soil kept clean and clear of grass and weeds. My method of planting in the summer is to prepare my soil and have it ready, and wait for a season, and then plant in cloudy, showery weather if possible. If dry, the plants must be puddled or watered. If the sun is very hot shading would be quite beneficial. It has been suggested to me by Mr. E. T. Hudson, an experienced cultivator of the strawberry, that a good stand could more easily be obtained by planting between cotton in the cotton rows. I believe this plan would work well, as in July the cotton is large enough to shade the plants, and I am confident the plants would make satisfactory growth, as I now have very fine plants growing immediately under many of my peach trees, of the Nunan variety, and indeed, the finest berries that was picked last season in my peach trees; and then it is cheaper to plant between cotton for there is no preparation of soil to be made, and no fertilizing to do, and I cannot see how the plants could be a drawback to the growth of cotton. The plants would certainly appropriate any element in the soil, or fertilizer which the cotton fails to take up; it is an excellent plan to follow Irish potatoes, beans, garden peas, wheat or oats with the Nunans. 

HINTS ABOUT HORSESHOEING .- All who wish to keep their horses' feet in a sound and healthy condition should spare no pains in employing men competent to do the work. First, the important process of paring the hoof.-This is work of more labor than many lowners of horses imagine, and from . this fact the smith will, if not carefully watched, give bimself as little trouble as possible, and a portion of the horn be permitted to accumulate month efter month, which in the unshed foot would by contact with the ground be worn down and the elasticity of the sole preserved. The proper thickness of the horn when the foot is ready for the shoe may be ascertained by the pressure of the thumb, the sole yielding in a slight degree to the force exerted. The crust should be left a little higher than the sole, but reduced to perfect level all around. A great many smiths burn the shoe on to make it level, but this is a very poor practice, and no man should allow it. Some blacksmiths are apt to put on too short shoes. There are a great many horses that become lame and useless by this heedlessness. Many blacksmiths cut and curve the frog until the cutting edge of the buttress reaches the quick of the foot; this should rever be allowed, as the frog is a tenacious and elastic material produced for the express purpose of receiving the heavy jar when the horse ceiving the heavy jar when the horse is travelling on a hard road. In rare cases the frog may be trimmed a little, but disastrous consequences often follow the excessive dressing off of this important part of the foot. 


