Third-Term Disasters.—According to the New York Sun the third-term scheme met with unexpected disasters last week. State Conventions for the election of delegates to the Republican National Convention at Chicago were held in New Hampshire, New Jersey, Wisconsin, Delaware, Maryland, Tennessee, and Mississippi; and one of the Congressional districts of Massachusetts has held a Convention for the same object.

Of the 756 delegates to Chicago, 600 have now been chosen. Even if New York and Pennsylvania were to bow their necks to the Utica Harrisburg yokes and cast 128 votes unanimously for Grant, there would still be a majority of 44 against him in this aggregate of 600 delegates.

There remains to be chosen 156 delegates, including the 22 from Michigan and the 42 from Illinois, two very important States in the canvass. In the election of these 156 delegates Grant must meet with better success than he has in the last two weeks, or the third-term plot will come to a timely end at Chicago.

The Position of the Markets.—There is a very general tendency for all staple articles to go lower. The principal cause of this is undoubtedly the unduly high prices which have ruled for some time back, and now they are only seeking their natural level.

Wheat Prospects.—The first bad news we have had this spring with reference to the growing wheat, comes from Davis county, where, it is said, the rust has attacked it and in places threatens to ruin it.

King, of Spotsylvania, and Miss Alice R. Carr, of Guilford county. As many of our readers may never witness such ceremonies we will give an account of their proceedings.

Massachusetts for Bryan.—The Democracy of Massachusetts has spoken in Convention and the choice is unanimously for Hays. Tilden has no following in the 'Bay State,' and of all the other possible candidates of the Democratic party, there is no one who will be supported so enthusiastically as the Senator from Delaware.

Democratic Convention of Michigan.—The Republican State Convention met this morning in the Opera House. About two hundred delegates were in attendance, and all the counties represented.
