STIRBING THE SOIL - We cannot too earnestly urge upon farmers the necessity of stirring the soil especially in dry weather. It is the only possible means of providing against drouth. It is a wise prevision of nature that when water is most needed it is most abundant in the atmosphere. No fact is better established than this and that the capacity of the air to absorb and give out moisture varies with its temperature—it being greatest when it is hottest. At fifty degrees only one fiftieth of the volume of air is water while at a hundred degrees it is one-fourteenth.

It is also well known that when the air-surcharged, as it always is, with with more or less moisture—comes in contact with any substance colder than itself, the moisture is condensed and deposited on that substance. It follows; therefore as a necessary consequence, that the more a soil is stirred the more finely and deeply it is pulverized, the more the air can penetrate through it, until it reaches a point below the surface where the earth is colder than itself, and where moisture is precipitated, and being absorbed by the particles of soil is again brought upward by capillary attraction until it reaches the rootlets of plants, to be by them appropriated to building up their structures. - Ex.

Those transplanted during the daylight shed their blossoms, producing little or no fruit; while those translight ched their blossoms, producing little or no fruit; while those transplanted in the dark maintained their condition fully. He did the same with ten dwarf trees, after the fruit was one-third grown. Those transplanted their fruit.



STIRRING THE SOIL.—We cannot too earnestly urge upon farmers the necessity of stirring the soil especially in dry weather. It is the only possible means of providing against drouth. It is a wise provision of nature that when water is most needed it is most abundant in the atmosphere. No fact is better established than this and that the capacity of the air to absorb and give out moisture varies with its temperature—it being greatest when it is hottest. At fifty degrees only one fiftieth of the volume of air is water while at a hundred degrees it is one-fourteenth.

It is also well known that when the air-surcharged, as it always is, with with more or less moisture—comes in contact with any substance colder than itself, the moisture is condensed and deposited on that substance. It follows: therefore as a necessary consequence, that the more a soil is stirred the more finely and deeply it is pulverized, the more the air can penetrate through it, until it reaches a point below the surface where the earth is colder than itself, and where moisture is precipitated, and being absorbed by the particles of soil is again brought upward by capillary attraction until it reaches the rootlets of plants, to be by them appropriated to building up their structures.—Ex.




