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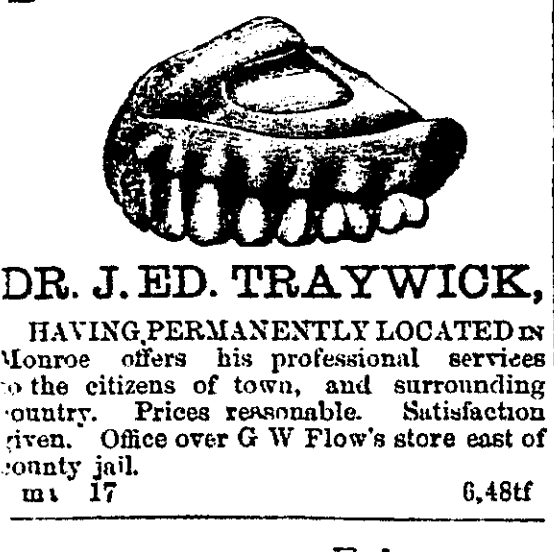
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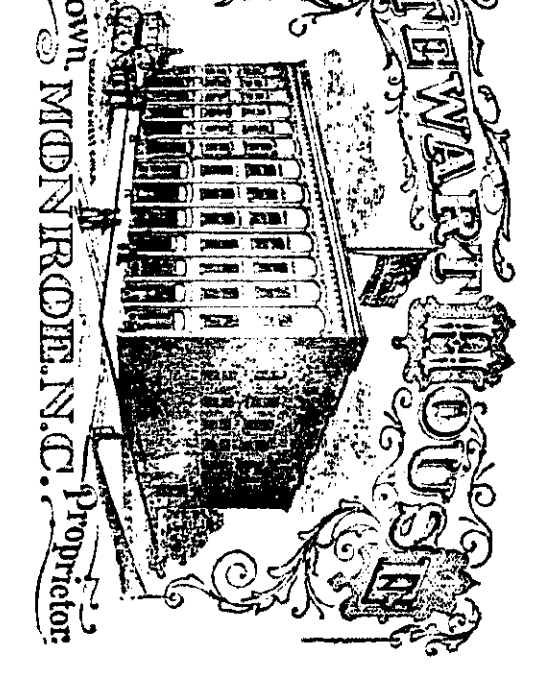

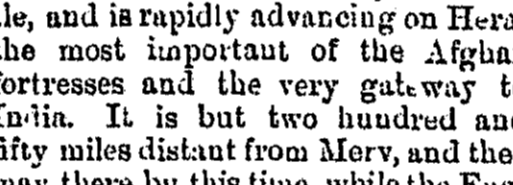

Sowing Oats and Wheat Together.—The experiment has been made of sowing oats and wheat together, with a view to obtaining a more covering for the wheat. The seed in the two parts of wheat, was sown in the fall and the oats sprang up quickly and were killed by the early frost, the stalks and leaves lying on the ground all winter, keeping the snow from blowing away and preventing the sun from thawing the frozen ground.

Hay Making.—The practice of waiting until grass is thoroughly ripe before cutting, and after cutting allowing it to remain in the field until the little juice that is left is dried out, is simply a relic of agricultural barbarism. This system of haymaking was evidently founded on the mistaken notion that more growth was secured by allowing the grass to stand until it was thoroughly ripened; and from a fear that it would rot and mold if put away before being thoroughly dried.

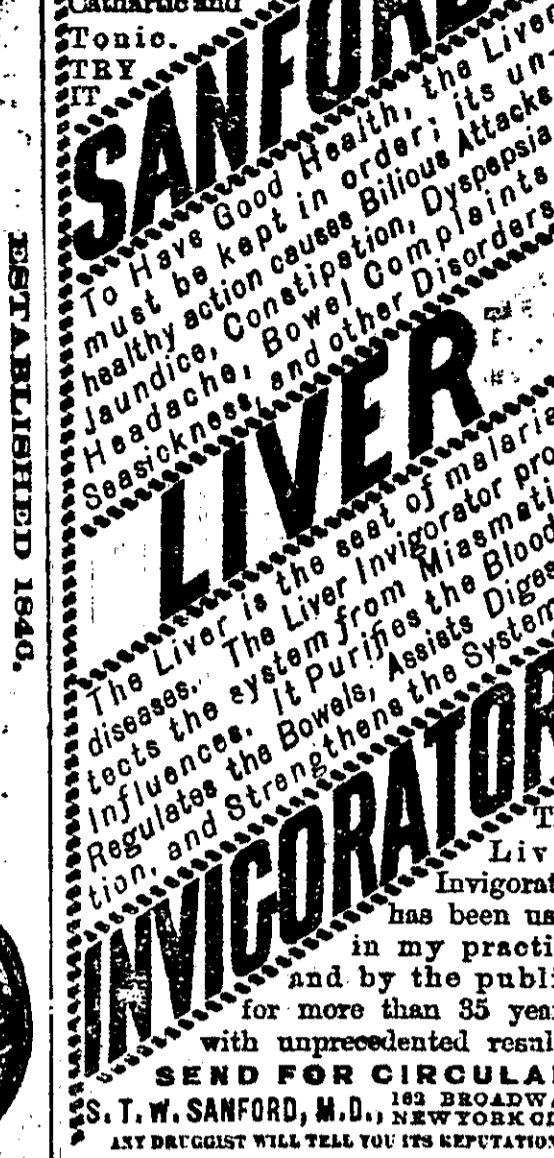
