





MEADOW GRASS HAY.—Take the poorest of our land here in old Surry and grass is the best paying crop. Even in poorest uplands, if properly managed, will pro uce enough marketable hay in two years to pay for or buy the land. Take up your old fields that are now lying idle, grub them off, turn the land well with a two-horse plow, then sow oats and plow in close with a bull-tongue plow. Sow grass seed in, say February, (clover timothy and dog food,) or orchard grass. Then harrow in well. In two years you can sell enough off one acre to buy more corn than you can make on six acres in corn or any other grain. We want our farmers to try this. Let all try a few acres, and if you don't succeed, tell us the reason. This year we have made good clover and timothy hay enough on twenty acres of upland to buy all the corn this fall that could possibly be made on double or treble the amount of land. 
