ADDRESS OF HON. WALTER L. STEELE, DELIVERED AT MONROE, on the 18th Sept., 1879, Before the Ex-Soldiers of Union County, at their Reunion Meeting.

According to the account given by Shakespeare in his tragedy of Julius Caesar, where Marc Antony came to "speak in Caesar's funeral" by the "leave of Brutus Cassius and the rest of the conspirators who assassinated the Emperor to preserve the freedom of Rome, the adroit orator commended his remarks by saying, "I come to bury Caesar, not to praise him."

Unlike Antony, I have not come to bury Caesar. That Caesar, whose flag the Confederate soldier followed, with heroic devotion and unflinching courage, for four long and woful years, was slain at Appomattox and Orange in 1865, when Lee and Johnston surrendered—was buried in the tomb forever, and must there sleep—disturbed only by the political ghosts who feast upon the carcasses of the dead to supply nutriment to their own hungry bodies.

The truly brave will never insult the helpless, nor prove false to pledges solemnly given. We have declared our fealty to the Constitution and the Union thereunder, and we mean, by the help of Heaven, to be true to ourselves, and the faith which we have given.

The only safe rule for the guidance of those who are entrusted with the management of the Government, is to adhere with unflinching tenacity to the chart of the Constitution. Whatever powers are, by that Instrument, conferred upon the United States, and denied to the States, the United States hold and can exercise without question.

As the soldiers of the Lost Cause fought with unsurpassed courage to maintain the controversy which they honestly espoused, so long as the emblems of their love had a place among the flags of nations—so with hearts full of sorrow, they shed tears when they saw it faded forever.

In a speech which I had reason to deliver in the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States, on the 19th of April last, I used the following language, which you will excuse me for here repeating:—"Soldiers in the Federal Army, like brave men, who gave unmistakable evidence of their convictions, by placing themselves in front of hostile armies, show their appreciation of those who are equally sincere, by avouching for the truthfulness of their declarations, when they have laid aside the habiliments of war."

We must obey the law, my friends, whether it is right or wrong. It is madness to attempt to break it. Even if it is unwise, evil, and mischievous, duty and interest both require that we shall yield submissive to it, trusting to the return of wisdom and justice, to effect its repeal or modification.

The greatest of all earthly boons to a people, is Constitutional liberty. Our fathers, on the other side of the Atlantic, struggled for many years, with royal prerogative, to secure it for themselves and their descendants. By successive steps, the liberty of the citizen was established as among the foundations of British Government; and when our immediate ancestors, who had settled in America, came to form Governments of their own, they were watchful to place in their Constitutions all proper safeguards to protect this invaluable right against all attempts to destroy it.

The truly brave will never insult the helpless, nor prove false to pledges solemnly given. We have declared our fealty to the Constitution and the Union thereunder, and we mean, by the help of Heaven, to be true to ourselves, and the faith which we have given.

To preserve and defend the Constitution and the Government of the United States, with all their legitimate powers unimpaired, and at the same time secure the reserved rights of the States, and the people, each true Southern "dares do all that may become a man—who dares do more is none," and he who expects more is wanting in all the essential elements of manhood.

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How to Preserve Cider.

A pure, sweet cider is only obtainable from clean, sound fruit, and the fruit should, therefore, be carefully examined and wiped before grinding.

In the press use hair cloth or gunny in place of straw. As the cider runs from the press let it pass through a hair-sieve into a large open vessel, that will hold as much juice as can be expressed in one day.

In the meantime clean barrels for its reception should be prepared, as follows: Some clean strips of rags are dipped in melted sulphur, lighted and burned in the bung hole and the bung laid loosely on the end of the keg, so as to retain the sulphur vapor within the barrel.

Professional cider makers are now using calcium (sulphate of lime), instead of mustard and sulphur vapor. It is much more convenient and effectual. To use it, it is simply requisite to add one-eighth to one quarter of an ounce of the sulphate to each gallon of cider in the cask, first mixing the powder in a quart of the cider and giving the latter a thorough shaking or rolling.

A little cinamon, wintergreen or sassafras, etc., is often added to sweet cider in the bottle, together with a dram or so of bicarbonate of soda at the moment of driving the stopper. This helps to neutralize free acids and renders the liquid effervescent when r estopped; but if used to excess it may prejudicially affect the taste.

To Grow Fine Wheat.

A heavy crop of clover, upon which is applied in early fall from two to three hundred pounds of plaster, and as much more the following April or May, and the same summer treated to eight or ten bushels of lime before breaking up, is perhaps the best preparatory process to insure three or four successive crops of wheat, especially with brine and an additional five bu. of lime be applied at each time of sowing.

And it is for this reason that it has come to be so extensively used in Onondaga county, New York and Southeastern Illinois, where the facilities for its procurement are so small an expense are so great—one farmer finding the application of ten bushels of lime to the acre to be of such service to his wheat as to have induced him to increase the quantity annually applied to his land to a thousand bushels.

Nothing better can be applied to a severe cut or bruise than cold turpentine; it will give a certain relief almost instantly. Turpentine is also a sovereign remedy for cramp. Saturate a piece of flannel with it, and place the flannel on the throat or chest; in every case three to five drops on a lump of sugar may be taken inwardly. Every family should have a bottle of turpentine on hand."
